

FoLS Update

Speaker Evening

Tuesday 1st May at 6.30pm in the School Hall

<u>Subject - Flooding in the Local Area; Speaker - Mike Potter</u>

A community talk to be given by Mike Potter about his involvement in negotiating and constructing a natural flood management scheme in Pickering. This talk is about an important environmental issue in Yorkshire and will be made accessible for a wide audience of all backgrounds. All welcome.

Doors open at 18:30. Talk will start promptly at 19:00.

Ticket price includes complimentary wine/juice/tea/coffee and nibbles. There will also be a fundraising raffle. Mike Potter worked first as a Maritime Radio Officer and then as a dull civil servant prior to (wholly inaccurately titled) early retirement in 2011, when he stepped into the role of Chair of Pickering and District Civic Society. In a moment of reckless abandon, he was also elected as the Liberal District Councillor of Derwent Ward in 2015. Following a series of severe floods in Ryedale, Mike participated in an academic study in 2008 that proposed upstream storage as a credible method of flood defence. After 10 years of anonymity battling for flood defences in Pickering and promoting Natural Flood Management (NFM) as a viable option nationally, he gained temporary notoriety as the price of success until those in power had the revelatory idea that NFM and a whole catchment approach should be part of Flood Risk Management (FRM). Mike's talk will explain the 10 year process, how NFM works and complements more commonly accepted FRM methods.... all in a mere 45 minutes. There will be plenty of time for questions and discussion. Norton College taster day report!

"On the 13th of March 2018 all the year 5s went to Norton College for a taster day. All together there was nine year 5s going and they all enjoyed it.

COLLEGE "We departed at 9.30am and boarded a Norton minibus which took us to Norton. The people who went from Langton were Robert, Niall, Javan, Hettie, Daisy, Thomas E, Thomas R, Ellie and Sophie.

"When we got there we had to sit in a hall and wait for a chat with the headmaster Mr Loftus who told us about what lessons there are and what we are going to do. There was roughly 6 schools there and there were Rillington, Settrington, Langton, Norton CP school, Leavening and Hunmanby.

"Our first lesson was science were we were seeing which was the fizziest drink, Coke, Lemonade or fizzy water. To do this experiment we had to use the equipment such as a delivery tube, a bung, a conical flask, a measuring cylinder and a bowl of water.

"When we started we were given safety specs and was told to put them on. We worked in partners or in threes. Then we had to fill the conical flask with one of the three drinks until it reached 50ml and after that quickly put the bung on top of it with the delivery tube stuck. Whilst doing this are partner would put the measuring tube in the bowl of water and fill it up then place it upside down in the water. After that we put the end of the delivery tube under the measuring cylinder and the water went down because of the gases pushing it out. The fizziest drink was the fizzy water because it went down by 8cm3 the second fizziest drink was the coke because it went down by 60cm3 and finally the least fizzy drink was the lemonade because it went down by 30 cm3.

"Our next lesson was music were we had to sing some African songs called four white horses and one called banawa. We had to march around in a circle singing banawa, banawa, banawaeyo. Afterwards we had to do a

weird clapping thing whilst singing the four white horses song. To change direction whilst marching, Thomas E had to bang a drum as loud as possible and when we heard it we had to walk the opposite direction.


